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Introduction

The NADA Policy Toolkit is a resource designed to support non government drug and alcohol services to develop and review their own policy documents. This resource provides practical policy development templates related to governance & leadership, administration & support, and service delivery.

The toolkit has been developed by NADA in consultation with and for its members. The resource was created to enhance the capacity of NADA members to undertake formal quality improvement programs.

This resource has been created specifically for non government drug and alcohol organisations in NSW, however other organisations may find the content relevant and useful.

Background

There are a growing number of requests from the NADA membership for template policies and supporting documents. Both formal and informal feedback received from NADA members indicates that members would greatly benefit from the development of a policy toolkit. The 2009 annual NADA member feedback survey, highlighted that members would like NADA to focus on providing more support to assist their organisation's quality improvement program.

The development of a policy toolkit for the NADA membership is a collaborative project, between the NADA Sector Development Program and the NADA Cross Sectoral Support and Strategic Partnership (CSSSP) project staff.

The toolkit will complement other NADA initiatives, such as the Quality Improvement Resource Tool for Non Government Drug and Alcohol Agencies. The Resource Tool was developed in partnership with the Australian Council on Healthcare Standards (ACHS) to support non government drug and alcohol agencies to apply the EQUIP4 Standards and to address important areas that are relevant to the speciality of drug and alcohol service provision. This toolkit will also assist organisations undertaking a formal quality improvement program using the Health and Community Service Standards, provided through Quality Management Services (QMS).

How to use this resource

This toolkit has a range of template policies and supporting documents that can be adapted to suit your organisation's needs. The template documents provide organisations with key considerations, information and references that will assist the policy writing and review process.

Locating policy documents

The policy and supporting document templates have been grouped into three key content areas which are located in three folders on the CD-ROM:

- 1. Governance and Leadership:** Documents in this category provide guidance on effective management, external relationships and providing a safe working environment for staff.
- 2. Administration and Support:** This group of documents covers a wide range of policies that support the organisation's ongoing work. For example: human resources, project planning, evaluation and information management.
- 3. Service Delivery:** This group of policies are directly related to the broad spectrum of services provided by organisations, including; harm minimisation, privacy and confidentiality, client participation, client access and treatment management.

The folders can be downloaded directly onto your computer by selecting the folder required and dragging it onto your desktop, or by copying and pasting the folder to the desired location on your computer.

To locate and download a specific document, a **mapping document** (see Figure 1) is located on the CD-ROM which lists all the template documents available in the toolkit. To download a specific document, open the mapping document and select the document that you would like to review by holding down the CTRL button and clicking the left button on the mouse.

Once you have opened the document save it on your computer hard drive before starting to modify the template.

Modifying the documents

All documents have prompts to insert information that is relevant to your service such as; **[insert organisation name]** and **[insert position]**.

Delete any content sections that are not relevant for your service.

The reference section at the end of each policy document provides some key links and resources relevant to the specific content of the document (see Figure 2).

The template Policy Development Policy provides a detailed outline of the policy development process and will provide guidance for consideration when writing and reviewing policies. Some additional general resources and links have been provided in the next section of the **how to guide**.
